Pastor's Corner --- WWJS? or WWJD?

Let's start with **WWJS**? What would Jesus say? We have multiple examples in our Bible that quote the words of Jesus. Some of us have what are called Red Letter Bibles. They have the words or quotes of Jesus printed in red, so they stand out. It certainly makes it easier for us to find and follow how Jesus spoke to those who were willing to listen. The Sermon on the Mount is found at the beginning of Matthew 5:3 with the Beatitudes. Jesus speaks on Anger at 5:21, Swearing at 5:34 and Retaliation at 5:38. Chapter 5 ends with Loving your Enemies.

The beginning of Chapter 6 is about Giving and Praying. The Lord's Prayer starts at Matthew 6: 9. You will find an absolute statement about forgiveness at verse 14 and no wiggle room for any of us at verse 15. There is a section on worry at verse 6:25.

In Chapter 7:1 we are told not to judge others and Jesus explains how we will be judged by God his Father. The Golden Rule is found in 7:12. At the end of Chapter 7; 24 we are told to be Hearers AND Doers. The parable of building your house on a rock rather than the sand is what Jesus uses.

Now we know what Jesus said. (WWJS) And he said it so succinctly in the three chapters 5-7 of Matthew. Many of the same teachings are also found scattered throughout Luke as well. But Matthew has them neatly contained in these three chapters. It makes it so easy for us to study and reflect upon.

Be Hearers AND Doers. We cannot ignore WWJD. After we have studied and reflected upon what Jesus said we MUST become doers of the Word. We cannot be one without the other. We are to live out our FAITH. Jesus certainly was not only the speaker. He was the doer. His actions spoke louder than his words.

- Jesus healed the unclean. Lepers, Samaritans, the bleeding woman...
- Jesus ate with who were considered sinners. Tax collectors, etc.
- Jesus let the bullies speak for themselves. He did not argue back. (Are you a King? "You say I am.")
- Jesus would not be tricked by the Scribes or Pharisees.

It is not easy to walk in the same sandals Jesus wore. We are not Jesus. We are given the words of guidance to live our lives the best way we can, always striving to do better than we did yesterday. We know WWJS. We have it written down in Matthew chapter 5 – 7 to do a check on ourselves. Now we have to try to do - - WWJD.

There are only 109 verses in those three chapters. Some Bibles have them broken down into 24 segments.

- They cover our reactions to what is going on around us.
- They cover our moods.
- They cover how we are to treat others.

Remembering that it is a microcosm of how to live in the first century. Some of the absolutes are based on the cultures and others the way women were considered property and thus treated during that time. Nearly all other segments are as relevant today as they were then. There is not much wiggle room when we look closely at the teachings of Jesus.

So, what are we to do? We are to study these three chapters. Perhaps read one or two segments a day and reflect over them, perhaps with a family member or prayer partner. Build them into your daily lives of how we are to live and treat others. We are called upon as followers of Jesus to both SAY and DO as Jesus would have done in this time - in 2025.

Show your support by wearing YOUR FAVORITE sport team apparel or colors to the 10:00am Worship Service. After the service the kids will be collecting for the Hungry.






NOAH SIGHT & SOUND BUS TRIP!



Engaging the Stranger Within: The Northeastern PA Synod's Racial Justice Work

Growing up in the American South, much of what was taught about racism dealt with history-slavery, annexation, Jim Crow, and integration. What (and how) we were taught in school, and the ways our community and churches remained unofficially segregated were "just the way things were." There was a disconnect between the way things were and why. Racism was something that

had happened, and we were living in the status quo of the Civil Rights Movement. And with that history focused so heavily in the South, it was like racism was somehow localized and intensified in that region, and we were more directly impacted by its legacy.

The privilege of my seminary formation and exposure to different contexts have shown just how limited my awareness of racism's pervasiveness extends. Racism is a part of every community, congregation, home, and heart. It isn't localized more intensely in one place or another. Our communities, workplaces, and churches in Northeastern Pennsylvania face the same legacy and challenges of confronting racist prejudices and practices, even if they expose themselves in different ways.

Cultural isolationism, unawareness of our past and current exploitation of the Lenni Lenape and Delaware peoples, emphasis on the immigrant heritage of our congregations while dismissing immigrant communities across the street, and an apathy to acts of violence against persons of color permeates our pews. Confronting personal, local, regional, and national instances of racial prejudice

is as important now as ever. The gospel gives us the assurance that the way things are is not how God calls us to be. To get from here to there, we need help learning what we don't know, and hearing firsthand from our neighbors how we can work together to resist racism.



Through your Mission Support generosity, our Synod has the opportunity to walk together in more intentional ways as we learn about our communities' and congregations' complicity in racial prejudice and work for racial justice. Loving the land we steward in Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod and the people who occupy it, and healing the hurt of our ancestral and contemporary practices, begins with engaging the stranger we do not wish to see in ourselves so that we can better engage the stranger we do not currently see in our neighbors.

Racial Justice Boundary Training for rostered leaders, Synod Council and Staff, and congregational lay leaders has been an invaluable resource for beginning this work in our Synod. In January, we collaborated with Metropolitan Community Church of the Lehigh Valley and our own Synod's LGBTQ Task Force at the Lutheran Center for a day of worship and action called MLK Jr. Day of Prayer and Service. Partnership with Lutheran Advocacy Ministry of Pennsylvania (LAMPa), Liberty Lutheran's MLK Day of Service, and local ecumenical and interfaith agencies committed to the course of justice in our neighborhood are but a few crucial ways we are already naming and confronting racism together as Christ's church, along with our







Compassion

Dear Lehigh Mission District,

The book Mortality by the late Christopher Hitchens documents his battle with esophageal cancer.

A quote in the book expressed by a religious believer who mocked Hitchens' condition with the question, "Who else feels Christopher Hitchens getting terminal throat cancer [sic] was God's revenge for him using his voice to blaspheme him?" (Hitchens, 2012, p12).

As soon as I read the question, my immediate response was similar to Hitchens, "which mere primate is so damn sure that he can know the mind of god?" (Hitchens, 2012, p13).

Let's be clear, no one can know the mind of God.

Pastors are in the profession to interpret and translate ancient religious writings. This involves figuring out what the ancient writers' intentions were regarding their view about God and the community. Still, these ancient biblical authors didn't know the mind of God when they were writing.

So this idea that God was getting revenge on Hitchens for his atheistic views begs another question: What revenge was God after by inflicting cancer to those who already believe in God?

God or no God, believers and non-believers have been afflicted by this dreadful disease.

An interpretation based on one's feelings cannot justify God's intentions whether the person be an atheist or a theist. It would be cruel to choose one group as deserving of cancer.

The Gospel writers, however, describe Jesus as having compassion on the sick. "He had compassion for them." Or "He was moved with compassion for them." Over and over again, the gospels point to how Jesus showed compassion for the people afflicted by diseases.

Jesus's compassion expressed by the authors indicates how believers ought to live with one another especially towards the sick.
